#### Horses Can Feel Emotions in Human Voices

Studies show horses can detect emotional tones in a person's voice — they can sense if someone is happy, angry, or nervous by how they sound.



## Horses Can Recognize Themselves in Mirrors

Recent research suggests that horses have self-awareness — they can recognize themselves in a mirror, a trait shared with only a few other animals like elephants, dolphins, and magpies.

#### **Did You Know?**

- When horses greet each other, they often do it by breathing into each other's noses it's their special way of saying hello.
- Horses can sleep both standing up and lying down, but they only get deep, REM sleep while lying down for short periods.
- The pattern of ridges on a horse's hoof is as unique as a human fingerprint no two hoof patterns are exactly alike.



#### TIP OF THE MONTH

#### CHOOSING THE RIGHT BIT - IT'S ALL ABOUT THE HORSE

Just like athletes need well-fitting gear, horses need bits that suit their anatomy and preferences. Horses can and should have a say in what bit feels right for them.

#### Key Fit & Comfort Considerations

- Horses differ in: tongue size, palate height, lip thickness, saliva production, and mouth space
- Watch for signs: excessive chewing, head tossing, open mouth, resistance

#### Main Bit Mouthpiece Types

- 1. Straight Bar (Mullen/Ported)
  - Acts on tongue/lip corners; no palate pressure if fitted correctly
  - Good for fussy mouths, tongue over bit, or overbending
  - Not ideal for strong horses that lean

#### 2. Single Jointed

- Nutcracker action; pressure on bars, lips, and sides of tongue
- Can jab the palate many horses react by opening their mouths
- More mobile than straight bars discourages leaning

#### 3. Double Jointed

- Peanut: gentle and rounded great starting bit
- French Link: low profile, suits large tongues and low palates
- Dr Bristol: harsh when used flat-side down (but may be gentler if flipped per original patent)
- Barrel: acts like straight bar but allows independent rein aids — good for uneven rein contact

#### 4. Multi-Jointed (Waterford)

- Prevents leaning/grabbing; acts on tongue, bars, lips
- o Can cause uneven pressure and be bulky
- o Not ideal for small mouths or large tongues

#### Other Key Factors

- Bit Material:
  - Stainless steel = dry, cold
  - Sweet iron, copper = warmer, encourages salivation
  - Plastic/Nathe = soft feel, good for overbenders — but check regularly for damage
- Saliva Management:
  - Too much = discomfort
  - Choose stable bits for horses who oversalivate
- Positioning & Fit:
  - Adjust based on bit type, mouth shape, cheek teeth position, and lip flesh
  - Bit should sit comfortably without pressing into lips or teeth
- Width: about a finger's width visible on either side
  - o Cheekpiece & Ring Style:
  - Eggbutt = better for over-benders
  - Loose ring = discourages leaning
  - Choose cheekpiece for discipline and control; horse chooses the mouthpiece
- Important Reminder
  - ✓ Always check teeth first hidden dental issues can make any bit painful
  - Use a qualified equine dentist (BAEDT or vet-trained)
