FUN FACTS

• Male horses have 40 teeth when they are adults (usually from around five-years-old), while mares have 36 teeth. In both cases horses' teeth take up more space in their heads than their brains.



- The longest tail ever recorded on a horse, according to the Guinness Book of Records, belonged to a mare in Kansas, called JJS Summer Breeze and measured 381cms (12 foot 6 inches) on 23rd August 2007.
- Horses produce approximately 10 gallons of saliva a day.
- The tallest horse on record was a Shire named Sampson. He was 21.2hh (7 feet, 2 inches) tall. Find out more about the world's largest horse breeds.
- Estimates suggest that there are around 60 million horses in the world, but...

There were no horses in Australia until 1788, when they arrived with with the first Western settlers, and were used for farming and utility work. Only the strongest and fittest horses survived the hard sea journey over from Europe and Australian horses still maintain a reputation for being amongst the hardiest equines in the world.





TIP OF THE MONTH

Choosing the Right Cinch for Your Horse

A properly fitted cinch is essential for both rider and horse safety. Whether trail riding or competing, selecting the right cinch ensures comfort, stability, and peak performance.

Tip 1. Measuring for the Right Fit

Measure from one heart girth/sweet spot under your horse's belly to the other side. Another method is measuring from the bottom of the saddle rigging on one side, under the belly, to the other side, then subtracting 16 inches. The cinch D-rings should sit flat against the horse's sweet spot—too high or low can cause discomfort and soreness.



Tip 2. Material Matters

Your horse needs flexibility in the cinch for comfortable movement. Leather latigos allow natural expansion and movement, providing a secure but comfortable fit.

Synthetic materials may lack this natural give.

Tip 3. Cinch Width & Saddle Rigging

The width of the cinch should match your saddle's rigging placement to avoid pinching or pressure points:

- Full Rigged: Cinch sits directly under the pommel.
- 7/8 Rigged: Slightly behind full rigging.
- 3/4 Rigged: Further back still.
- Center Fire: Cinch is centered between pommel and cantle.

The further forward the cinch sits, the more aware you must be of elbow pinching. Wide roper cinches may cause discomfort for certain horses in forward-rigged saddles but work well in others. Narrow cinches on center fire saddles may not distribute pressure evenly.

Tip 4. Fit Over Fashion

Every horse is unique—what works for one may not work for another. Watch for sweat and dirt buildup, signs of friction, or changes in performance.

Taking the time to properly fit your cinch ensures your equine partner is ready to perform, no matter the activity!
