TIP OF THE MONTH

BEAT THE HEAT AND BUGS!

With June bringing warmer weather, prioritize keeping your horse comfortable and healthy.

Focus on Hydration and Fly Control:

- Ensure Fresh Water: Always provide your horses with ample clean, fresh water. Clean water troughs frequently to prevent algae and bacteria buildup, encouraging them to drink more.
- Encourage Drinking: Consider adding electrolytes to their diet or feeding soaked hay to help maintain hydration levels.
- Fly Management: Summer means more flies and insects. Implement a thorough fly control program, including:
 - Regular manure removal: Reduces fly breeding areas.
 - Fly sprays and traps: Effective for repelling and catching flies.
 - Fly sheets and masks: Protect your horse from bites and head tossing.
 - Fly predators: Consider introducing beneficial insects that prey on flies. These can be bought on Amazon!
- Adequate Shade and Turnout: Provide natural shelters, run-in sheds, or strategically placed trees to offer shade during the hottest parts of the day. Adjust turnout schedules to cooler times (early morning or late evening) to reduce heat stress and sunburn.
- Cooling Techniques: Hose off your horses during the summer heat, starting with their hooves and moving upwards. A fan in the stable (with cords safely out of reach) can also improve air circulation.



Remember: Staying proactive with fly control and hydration during the summer months will help prevent discomfort and potential health issues for your equine companions.
